# STRENGTHENING OF SAFE MR AND FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES AND REDUCTION OF UNSAFE ABORTIONS FOR IMPROVING SRHR SITUATION IN BANGLADESH (SAFE MR PROJECT)



This project is being implemented in collaboration with Reproductive Health Services Training & Education Program (RHSTEP) with the support of Sida.

#### **GOAL**

The Goal of this project is to improve Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights (SRHR) and wellbeing of women and adolescents in Bangladesh.

#### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of the project is to contribute in reduction of Maternal Mortality, morbidity from unsafe abortion and improve the SRHR situation of women and adolescents in the project areas.


#### **OBJECTIVE**

- III. Generate increased demands for SRHR services among the catchments area population;
- IV. Strengthen advocacy and policy dialogue to sustain enabling environment for safe MR and SRHR services and SGBV:
- V. Generate and disseminate evidence for improved SRHR services and Policy influence;
- VI. Strengthening ICT for transparency, accountability and better management of the project;
- VII. Achieve sustainability of the SRHR Consortium partners.

#### ADOLESCENT HEALTH FAIR

- 'Adolescent Health Fair' was organized in YMCA School, Dhaka on December 21, 2023.
- The main objective was to raise awareness on SRHR issues during adolescence, encourage positive health practices and to organize health education sessions with display of BCC Materials.
- Stalls were organized to display the cheap and available fruits, vegetables and other nutritious foods vital for the physical and mental development of the adolescents.
- Discussion sessions on: child marriage, necessity of health awareness during adolescence, negative impact of drugs on health and on family.
- Competition on writing essay and poems on health issues, reciting poems, art competition, health quiz contest, and dress as you like were arranged.
- Music, dance, group dramas on health issues were also staged. More than 200 adolescents were present in the fairs along with teachers, parents, and they were found very active.

- The UPHCSDP-II is being implemented in Three Partnership Areas (PAs) by BAPSA.
- The goal of the project to improve the health status of the urban population, especially the poor, through improved, efficient, effective and sustainable Primary Health Care (PHC) Services.

#### THE OVERALL OBJECTIVE

To improve health, nutrition and family planning status of the urban population, particularly the poor, women, and children.

#### MAJOR AREAS OF SERVICES

Urban Primary Health Care Services Delivery Project-II (UPHCSDP-II) of BAPSA is being implemented in the above mentioned areas from August 2019. And the motto of the services is "Sebar Alo Shobar Kase" The major areas of services as provided by UPHCSDP-II are given bellow:

# FIELD BASED HEALTH AWARENESS AND DOOR TO DOOR VISIT

- 64 field workers visit door to door and raising awareness among the mothers and family about ANC, PNC, hospital delivery, delivery plan, child health care and imparting other health related information.
- Field Workers refer the patients to PHCCs and CRHCCs for health services.
- A total of 5,59,200, Clients were conducted directly by the field workers of BAPSA.
- These SC are run by Paramedics and supported by the field workers and helps to establish good referral linkage with the Primary Health Care Centres and Maternity Centre.

#### STAFF TRAINING PROVIDED

To provide health care services management team organized different training for the different level of project staff of CRHCC, PHCC: Doctors, Nurse, paramedics, FWV, Filed supervisors, Counsellors, Receptionists, BCC workers and Admin Assistants.

 The project also organized training for administration and finance, store management, BCC marketing, IPC and Counselling, VAW, quality assurance, MIS and Monitoring and Evaluation, and training also on ES D, EPI, FP Service & RTI, STI/HIV-AIDS, Infection prevention and Clinical waste management.

#### FREE SERVICE FOR RED CARD HOLDERS

- Project has a provision to provide at least 30% full free services by each category of services.
- 38,276 Households in the working area of PA-2, KCC. Out of those 7250 are red card holders.





- Red card holders received 56023 services in different components by PA-2, KCC.
- 79,200 Households are in PA-2, DSCC and 6696 are red cardholders.
- Red card holders received 32,156 services in different components.
- 91,639 Household of PA-4, DNCC and 11,039 are red cardholders
- Red card holders received 32,194 services in different components by PA-4, DNCC.

#### **SPECIAL SERVICE WEEK**

Special service week from 23 to 28 April'2023 was organized at Comprehensive Reproductive Health Care Centre (CRHCC): the services were: Breast cancer Screening, diet counseling on diet for the ANC mothers, weight measuring for the mothers and provided suggestions, children, and diabetics patients.

# IMPROVING SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS IN DHAKA



- For improvement of SRHR, including access to and availability of high quality and affordable SRH services: menstrual regulation (MR), post abortion care (PAC), and family planning (FP) all these are crucial for poverty reduction, health equity, and the empowerment of women and girls.
- ➢ Ipas Bangladesh, in collaboration with the Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives (MoLGRD&C), the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) is implementing a five-year project (this is the fourth year report ) in order to accessing a full range of SRH services, and in strengthening women's and girls' rights, including sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) response and referral.
- The project is being implemented in collaboration with local partners: BAPSA, RHSTEP, SERAC, Bangladesh, OGSB.
- ➤ The project intends to work with 154 health facilities, including 30 Urban Primary Health Care Services Delivery Project (UPHCSDP) clinics, 15 garment health clinics, 100 General Practitioners (GPs), and 9 referral facilities to improve health workers' skills and strengthen their capacity to provide client-centered, gender-sensitive and trauma-informed SRH services.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

To increase use of SRH services that uphold the rights of women and adolescent girls and are responsive to the needs of underserved and vulnerable groups living in urban slums in Dhaka, including during public health emergencies.

#### **Chapter-V**





Tuberculosis (TB), grappling with a substantial public health challenge as the country is one of the world's 30 high TB burden nations. This is being implemented in collaboration with BRAC.

#### The objectives of the program are as follows:

- Every year new patients identified 221 per 1.00000 Population.
- All TB Patients bring under the DOTS.
- Ninety three percent TB Patients cured and treatment completed every year.
- Ensure quality services to all TB Patients.
- ➤ In 2023, treatment coverage reached by 79 per cent, and 95 per cent of diagnosed cases successfully completed treatment.
- ➤ BAPSA is providing TB services through 04 DOTS centers. Out of 04 TB Centers, 03 are belonging with Microscope for sputum test.
- During the reporting period 1150 TB Cases (all forms) were diagnosed and treated in the BAPSA supported centres.
- ➤ BAPSA organised social mobilization camp programs to raise awareness about TB at the community levels for early case detection and successful treatment.
- Established referral linkages with private practitioners for enhancing case findings and ensuring treatment.
- BAPSA observing world TB day 24 March every year.
